MCA tightens compliance regulations for companies

Seeks details, including photographs of headquarters, to put a check on shell firms

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Every company incorporated till December 31, 2017, has to disclose its particulars and registered office in a new return, a move aimed at tightening the noose around shell firms.

Experts say the move would increase the compliance burden on companies and be good for the economy in the long run.

Companies will have to give details of their location, photographs of their registered office, displaying external and inside portions, and also show at least one director.

All these would help authorities identify cases of multiple shell companies using one building.

The e-form ACTIVE-1 has to

be filed by April 25, according to changes in the Companies (Incorporation) Rules by the ministry of corporate affairs, effective from February 25. If filing is not done, companies will face action that includes striking off their names from registers. Such companies will be termed ACTIVE-non compliant. The ministry of corporate affairs has directed the registrar of companies to reject requests for change in authorised capital, paid up capital, registered office, amalgamation and de-merger from non-compliant companies.

Companies that have not filed financial statements or annual returns will be barred from filing ACTIVE returns.

A late fee of ₹10,000 would be levied in case the ACTIVE form is submitted after April 25

Sandeep Jhunjhunwala, director at Nangia Advisors (Andersen Global), said, "Though the incremental changes burden Indian corporations with newer compliances, in the long-run, it will give the required impetus for the desired growth of the Indian economy,"

Firms may have to geo-tag registered offices, furnish photos

Initiative seen as part of govt's efforts to weed out shell companies

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Companies will soon have to furnish photographs as well as longitude and lattude details of their registered offices, with the government stepping up efforts to weed out shell

companies.

Besides opting for geo-tagging rules, the Corporate Affairs
Ministry has decided to seek details about companies' auditors
and key managerial personnel,
among others.

As part of its efforts to curb shell companies, suspected to be used as conduits for illicit fund flows, the Ministry has notified a new electronic form ACTIVE-I (Active Company Tagging Identities and

Vertfication).

Companies incorporated on or before December 31, 2017, will have to submit the form to the Ministry on or before April 25. In case of non-submission of the form within the deadline, companies concerned would have to pay a late fee of ₹10,000 and would be marked as 'active non-compliant'.

A senior official told PTI that the notification of the form is a

big effort to identify every active company and the people behind them. This is also the first

time that the Ministry is asking for photograph as well as longitude and latitude details of registered offices of the compates, the official said.

À company has to provide the photograph of its registered office with at least one director or key managerial personnel who is signing the form, according to the Ministry.

The amendments made to the Companies (Incorporation) Rules under the Companies Act, 2013 would be effective from February 25.

Among others, companies that have been deregistered or in the process of being deregistered or under liquidation need not have to submit the

form. Sandeep Thunthunwala, Director at Nangia Advisors (Andersen Global), said in the last three to four years, a number of legislative amendments and regulatory measures have targeted shell companies, benami holdings, black money transactions and various means of tax

evasion.
"Now with the anticipated geo-tagging rules being notified for all companies incorporated before December 31, 2017, the requirement of putting the data of exact location such as lattitude and longitude, photographs etc of the registered office would help identify cases where one building houses multiple shell companies." he said.
